## **About**

With a background in graphic design, Kristina Dam, founder and Head of Design of Kristina Dam Studio, has always had a unique, artistic take on the products she creates for the home.

From the final plaster sculptures, Kristina Dam selected two sculptures and decided to produce them in sandstone in a limited edition run of only 100 pieces and engraved with the piece's individual number. The sandstone sculptures are crafted by hand by skilled artisans, making each sculpture unique in form and visible perception.





## The process

The Contour Sculpture came from a workshop with Danish artist Katrine Blinkenberg. With Katrine as a guide, a series of sculptures was created from plaster by hand. During the process the plaster was poured into giant balloons and then shaped based on the pressure to which the plaster is exposed during the drying process. The result is organic shapes that are both engaging and charmingly exaggerated.

This sculpting method has been carried out for centuries, notably by famed Danish sculptor Bertel Thorvaldsen, first creating sculpture in plaster and then re-creating the piece in more precious, durable materials, including marble, travertine, or sandstone.
